

Why support the Siskiyou Land Trust?

It is simple. Siskiyou County is still relatively undeveloped and one of the last remaining rural frontiers of great natural beauty and resources left in California. The pressures for development will compromise our agricultural land, forests, spectacular vistas, water resources and wildlife habitat.



How do we conserve, manage and restore land in Siskiyou County?

By working together with willing landowners the Siskiyou Land Trust uses several tools to accomplish its mission. These are only a few of the ways we can work with landowners. Please contact us to put together a plan that works for you.

• Fee Title Acquisition

Donating land for conservation purposes is truly one of the finest legacies a person can leave to future generations. An outright donation of land releases the landowner from the responsibility of managing the land and can provide substantial income tax, estate tax and property tax benefits.

A landowner can choose to continue to live on the land and receive a tax benefit now by donating a remainder interest and retaining a reserved life estate.

Land donations can establish an income for life or provide for loved ones in your estate by establishing a charitable gift annuity or a charitable remainder unitrust.

Conservation Easements

A conservation easement allows landowners to protect conservation values on their land by promising to limit incompatible development or use. These legally binding agreements can provide a substantial tax benefit while the owner continues to live on and manage the land. Under conservation easements, the land can be sold, leased, kept in agricultural production or bequeathed to heirs.



How does the Siskiyou Land Trust achieve its mission?

The Siskiyou Land Trust is a 501 (c) 3 non-profit organization. We strive to have the majority of our day-to-day operating activities funded locally by membership donations, fund raising events and grants from private foundations. We leverage our ability to conserve land by working with like minded local and regional partners to raise more money and protect more land than we could by ourselves.
